BARRETT

Tufnell Carbonel Barrett, Esq. of Shorne
P.C.C. Will dated 6th August 1856

All modern household furniture, plate, linen, china, etc., in his house, except carved oak sideboard and other similar furniture, and other antique furniture and all oak carvings, to wife Mary Ann. Residue to son Tufnell Samuel, subject to payment of debts, etc. By his marriage settlement, his wife is entitled to income from the sum of £3,700. He gives her an annuity of £100 for life or widowhood, from his real estate. His freehold cottage in Shorne, formerly called Clay Hall, adjoining the village pound, occupied by Mrs White and others, rent 7/6d per week, to his servant Sarah Eatwell, for life. His barn and stable in Shorne, opposite property of Messrs. Hurley and Solomon, abutting public road, and in his own occupation, to servant Stephen White, who has lived with testator for many years as gardener, for life. His freehold, copyhold and leaseholds in Kent and elsewhere, subject to payment of mortgages to free properties lefts to Sarah Eatwell and Stephen White, and for payment of debts and funeral costs, to son Tufnell, who is executor.

CARNEY

John Carney, Captain in H.M. 2nd or Royal Regiment of Infantry
P.C.C. Will dated 2nd March 1846

His real and personal estate, including his life insurance for £1,200 in Universal Life Assurance Society, King William Street, City of London, (except gold watch, chain and seals, left to him by his father, which goes to sister), to wife, Susannah Maplesden Carney, for herself and daughter Maria, who he commends to the "maternal and affectionate care of my said dear wife"; his wife is executor.

DUNN

William Dunn, on wife's headstone; Naval Pensioner 1881 Census; Sexton, 1891 and 1903 Kelly's Directory

FORREST

Ellen Forrest, Servant to Rev. J.J. Marsham, at Kirkby Overblow, Yorkshire, 1841 Census, she born in same county; In the 1851 Census she is in Shorne, but not it seems a live in servant.

HOLLANDS

Eleanor Hollands, Servant to Rev. J. Marsham at "Overblow House" in Shorne, 1891 Census.

Ellen Hollands, Wife of Henry Hollands at Higham, Agricultural Labourer, 1891 Census

JARRETT

Charles Jarrett, Gardener and Victualler at the "See Ho" inn, 1851 Census and Melville's Directory 1858
Appears in Parliamentary Poll Book 1847. Married Mary Botting at St. Margaret, Rochester in 1810

LINES

Alfred Lines, Wood Sawyer in Lambeth, 1901 Census, has one servant. Married Maria Drew in Norfolk in 1871

MARSHAM

Jacob Joseph Marsham, former Vicar of Shorne

Obituary from "The Times", 25th October 1894

"The *Church Review* announces the death of the Rev. JACOB JOSEPH MARSHAM, which took place on Tuesday last at the patriarchal age of 90. Born on February 8th 1804, at Rochester, where his father, the Hon. And Rev. Jacob Marsham, D.D., was one of the canons of the cathedral, he was educated at Eton and Christ Church, Oxford. His father was also a canon of Windsor, rector of Kirkby Overblow, Yorkshire, vicar of Wateringbury, Kent, and a prebendary of Wells.

Mr Marsham was ordained in 1827 as his father's curate at Kirkby Overblow. Ten years later he was presented by the Dean and Chapter of Rochester to the living of Shorne, Kent, which he held for 52 years, only resigning when he became blind. He had been hale and hearty to within a couple of days of his death, and at last succumbed to senile collapse.

For nearly 40 years he had been J.P. For the county of Kent. He was a grandson of the second Baron Romney and nephew of the third Baron, who was created Earl of Romney in 1801.

During Mr Marsham's long incumbency of Shorne he was instrumental in restoring the ancient parish church. He also built excellent national schools. It was in his churchyard that Charles Dickens, whose house at Gad's Hill is only just outside the parish, used to love to sit, as Foster records in his "Life of Dickens"; and up to the very last Mr Marsham never let wind, rain, snow or personal ailment keep him away from church and the Holy Communion"

Rev. Marsham's will was dated 18th February 1879, with a Codicil dated 2nd June 1891.

His executor was his nephew, Robert Henry Bullock Marsham. His personal estate was about £48,000 (about £3,000,000 in modern values). He left property to his nephew, Fitzroy D. Maclean; property at St. Kitts to nephew Robert Marsham. His nieces, Louisa Nevill, Emily Maclean and Fanny Hood were residuary legatees.

MITCHELL

Walter Mitchell, Esquire, the same man who sold the Manor of Randall to the Earl of Darnley in about 1793 ?
(Hasted's History of Kent)

Appears in Parliamentary Poll Book 1803

NOAKES

Edward Maplesden Noakes, Gentleman, late of Woolwich, now of Vauxhall Bridge Road, Westminster.
P.C.C. Will dated 4th March 1848 (Died at home of brother in law, W.S. Young, in Vauxhall Bridge Road)
To brother Francis Maplesden Noakes, his silver cigar case; to sister Frances Maplesden Young, £100. Rest and residue,
to brother Jarvis William Maplesden Noakes and brother in law, William Samuel Young, in trust for his mother and
brothers and sisters, in equal shares. Jarvis Noakes and William Young are executors.
Witnesses: Elizabeth Young, 30 Parliament Street and John Lake, 5 Great George Street.
Proved 26th September 1848
Died at the house of Mr W. S. Young in Vauxhall Bridge Road

Anna Noakes, Ivy Mill was a Paper Mill

SMYTHE

Edward Smythe, Senior, Wine, Spirit, Beer and General Merchant, 1851 Census; Merchant of Pipe's Place, 1861
Census; China Merchant of Swanscombe, 1871 Census. In and 1851 and 1861 he states born at Southwark, in 1871
born at Blackfriars.
Appears in Parliamentary Poll Book 1857

Edward Smythe, Junior, died at Gravesend, "The Times" death notices.

John Smythe, a Printer at Gravesend living with sister and husband, Mr. Phelps, a Bank Clerk, 1901 Census

TUFF

Henry Tuff, (Buried in Section C) a Groom at the Old Vicarage, living with mother in law, Elizabeth Baldwin, 1891
Census.

WARD

Joseph Youngman Ward, same man at the "Crown" 1891 Kelly's Directory, and in 1901 Census a Carpenter at
Gravesend, both he and Maria born in Norfolk.

WELLS

Joseph Wells, Retired Gardener, living in Shorne in 1851 Census, born Ireland

WILLIAMS

Alice Williams, Stained Glass Window inside church.

WOOD

Mary Agnes Wood, daughter of Samuel Barrett, died at 2 Princes Square, London, "The Times"
